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Abundant Blessings

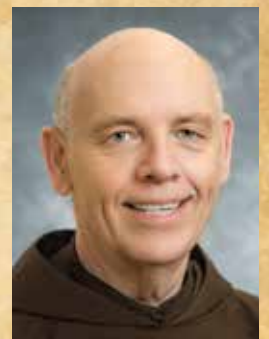

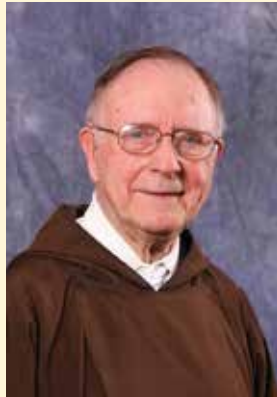


My Life With Blessed Solanus Casey

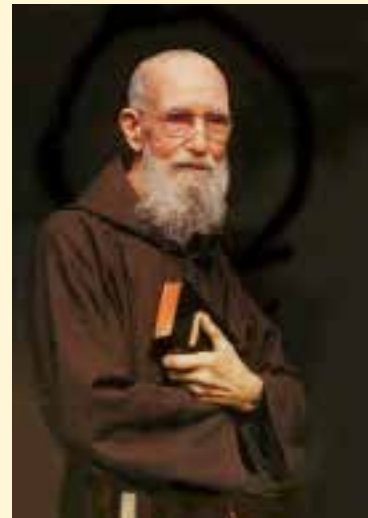
In 1953, after professing my first vows as a Capuchin friar, I continued my college studies at St. Felix Seminary in Huntington, Ind. Among the fifty-plus friars living there was Fr. Solanus, an 83-year-old in frail health and living in retirement. To us who were young seminarians, he seemed like just a nice old friar who simply blended in with everyone else.

But it didn't take long for us to recognize how special Fr. Solanus was. Every day he would receive a stack of mail from people who found out where he had been transferred. A friar had been assigned to help him answer the mail. Also, most of the phone



calls were for him. Often on Sundays there were chartered buses from Detroit coming down to see him. They would eat their picnic lunch on the front lawn, and then he would go out and visit with them. He would take them into our chapel and lead them in praying the rosary and the Litany of Our Lady; then close with Benediction.

I am thrilled that the Church will soon declare Fr. Solanus "Blessed." I have put together many other stories about his personal holiness and his healing ministry, and I would be happy to share them with parishes and other interested groups.



Capuchin Franciscans in Montana's Native American Reservations

St. Francis of Assisi, a true disciple of Christ and an outstanding example of Christian life, commanded to his brothers "to live according to the pattern of the holy Gospel." We, the Capuchin Franciscans in the Province of St. Joseph, commit ourselves to the command of our brother Francis in living our life according to the holy Gospel.



Flowing from the holy Gospel, we are called to follow in the footsteps of the poor and humble Christ as we joyfully proclaim the Good News to people of all cultures and nations including the Montana Native Americans from the Northern Cheyenne and Crow Reservations. We have faithfully served the Northern Cheyenne people for over 90

years and the Crow people for over 50 years. Our Capuchin presence in these two reservations was initially sought out in response to the needs of the people and to our call to spread the Good News.

Our presence and ministry with the Northern Cheyenne and the Crow People have focused on parishes where we nurture the people through the Sacraments while also building community. In the Northern Cheyenne Reservation, we serve people at St. Labre Parish in Ashland, Blessed Sacrament Parish in Lame Deer, and Christ the King in Busby. While in the Crow Reservation, we serve the people at St. Charles Parish in Pryor, St. Xavier Parish in St. Xavier, St. Dennis Parish in Crow Agency, Our Lady of Loretto Parish in Lodge Grass and St. Kateri Tekakwitha Parish in Wyola. We also serve at the various schools of the St. Labre System by teaching and celebrating Mass for the students.

As we continue to follow the command of our brother Francis "to live according to the pattern of the holy Gospel," we, the Capuchin Franciscans, dedicate ourselves in serving the Northern Cheyenne and Crow People. We ask God to continue to use us as God's instrument to transform the world through reverence by proclaiming the Good News to people of all cultures and nations.

This coming November 18th in Detroit Michigan, Father Solanus Casey, a member of the Province of St Joseph of the Capuchin Order, will be raised to the altar of Blesseds in the Roman Catholic Church. How has Father Solanus reached the point of being recognized as a Blessed by the church?

The path to Sainthood for Father Solanus was not begun by the Capuchins. It was rather the people who knew him in Detroit, New York, Indiana and other places where he served. After his death, the people came to the church and said, "This man is Holy and should be recognized as such by the church." It was through these good people that the Cause of Father Solanus Casey has risen up.

It is known that Father Solanus related especially to the poor and to the sick. But he related as well to all classes of people: workers, professionals, as well as the heads of corporations in Detroit. He was ecumenical and he was visited by Protestant ministers, rabbis and even atheists.

Father Solanus popularity very much rose out of his humanity. He was present to people and we know that he deeply prayed for people. Father Solanus will be remembered because of his closeness to people as well as his closeness to God. He leads us to a faith that is real and human. It is a faith that people can relate to. For that reason Father Solanus will always be a saint of the people.

Just be sure to transfer the stock directly to us (don't sell it on your own first).

GIFTS FROM RETIREMENT ACCOUNTS

Making a gift from your IRA is a tax wise way to support the Capuchins. Certain restrictions apply, though. For example, you must be at least 70 ½ years of age and the gift must come directly to us from the IRA custodian. Please call us for all the details.

CHARITABLE GIFT ANNUITIES

Creating a charitable gift annuity is an excellent way to provide not only for the future of the Capuchin friars, but also for you and your own future. Gift annuities pay you income for life at a very attractive rate that will never change. A portion of your payments is tax-free, and a charitable tax deduction is also available. In the future, what remains in the contract will support our friars and our many ministries.

GIFTS FROM DONOR ADVISED FUNDS

Donor advised funds allow people to place cash or stock into a fund and immediately receive a charitable deduction. Owners can then direct a portion of that fund to support their favorite charities. Since May 13, 1917, members of the Third Order of the St. Bonaventure Fraternity, Detroit, have met to sew for the Capuchin missionaries in the field. Now 100 years later, Eucharistic Mission Band members continue to faithfully gather twice a week to sew for the Capuchin missionaries.



Besides sewing vestments for the friars in the mission field, the Band also offers families and friends an opportunity to order a memorial vestment for their loved one, in lieu of flowers. An order includes the right to display a sample vestment at the funeral home. The Eucharistic Mission Band also makes vestments honoring special intentions such as anniversaries and birthdays. The group has sent vestments to missionaries on five continents.
